Role of Universities in the Reactivation and Sustainable Development of Satoyama Satoumi

The 4th International Forum on the Globally Important Agricultural Heritage Systems (GIAHS) is taking place in Nanao City, Ishikawa Prefecture on 29-31 May 2013. The important objective of the forum is to share knowledge and best practices on evolving heritage systems from different continents and countries. It is an opportunity to reinforce the collaboration and networking for the promotion and implementation of innovative approaches for dynamic conservation and management of agricultural heritage systems and sites. The Forum highlights new GIAHS sites for inclusion to the Initiative.

Activities were initiated to help spur conservation efforts since Noto's Satoyama and Satoumi (Ishikawa Prefecture) and Sado's Satoyama (Niigata Prefecture) were officially designated as the 1st GIAHS sites in Japan. The challenges posed by the changing age structure of the local communities encouraged us to develop activities for a holistic approach to help reactivate and build a stronger Noto Satoyama and Satoumi. Together with Ishikawa Prefectural University, UNU-OUIK, UNU-ISP and the league of municipalities, Kanazawa University through Satoyama Satoumi Project would like to take this opportunity to organize the 3rd International GIAHS seminar on the Role of Universities in the Reactivation and Sustainable Development of Satoyama Satoumi. The main goal is to provide support to Japan GIAHS sites to encourage broad range of stakeholders to engage in sustainable development and conservation activities in satoyama and satoumi. The seminar discusses the role of the universities to foster innovative solutions through research and technology, to reactivate and sustain satoyama satoumi and improve the quality of life. The seminar provides networking and communication opportunities for participants working with common interests in satoyama and satoumi. Most importantly, the seminar offers an opportunity to address pressing problems such as the progressive increases of deer, bear and wild boar populations; and the major issue of "ageing" human population. For this purpose, we have invited the Municipalities of Noto and Sado, universities, research and educational institutes, private sector and general public in Japan to this important event.
